- Panel or fold-over cards to coordinate with your envelopes. They need to be suitable for watercolor and ink and should match or coordinate with the envelopes. You can use 140 lb watercolor paper cut to size if you like.
- · Ruler or t-square ruler (whatever you have is fine)
- Pencil. An HB or any of the H pencils will do well.
 Soft eraser, any type.
- Micron or similar pen- (optional) I prefer a black fine point, anything from .01-.03 but whatever you have is fine as long as it's not too thick.
- Colored pencils- (optional) You may want to use these for adding small details or highlights. Use whatever you have; sharpen so you've got a fine point.
- Print out or have the reference sheets available on a separate device (not the one you will be using for Zoom) because you will need to choose your favorites and refer to them during the workshop.
